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
REFLECTION QUESTIONS

Social media for civic participation Some Evidence

Support individual and group use of internet-based tools to receive news, communicate or share information, collaborate on ideas, mobilize networks, and make collective decisions Family and Social Support

Social service integration Expert Opinion

Coordinate access to services across delivery systems and disciplinary boundaries (e.g., housing, disability, nutrition, physical health, mental health, child welfare, workforce services, etc.) Family and Social Support

Trauma informed approaches to community building Expert Opinion

Support and strengthen traumatized and distressed residents and communities and address effects of trauma (e.g., violence, poverty, homelessness, social isolation, racism, etc.) via a comprehensive, multi-stakeholder... Family and Social Support

Youth empowerment programs Some Evidence

Help prepare children and youth to be active members of their communities with social supports, job skills development and placement, mentoring, intensive case management, etc. Family and Social Support

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IN FRANKLIN COUNTY, THOSE IN POVERTY ARE

- Younger 31% of the population under 18
- More diverse nearly 40% of the African American and Latino population
- More likely to be disabled one in three disabled persons are at or under 125% of FPL
- More likely to be immigrant 1 in 3 foreign-born residents are at or under 125% of FPL
- More likely to reside in high need neighborhoods

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LESSONS LEARNED

- Conversation with stakeholders goes a long way
- Create opportunities for partners to commit
- Avoid perceptions of 'initiative fatigue'
- Create learning opportunities to socialize the model
- Understand this is a new approach to the work
- Don't try to boil the ocean acknowledge the 'good place to start'
